

President's Welcome

Over the past 30 years, the commitment, creativity, and determination of institutions and individuals within the ISEP Network have turned dreams into reality for over 34,000 students worldwide, many of whom may not have had access to international education otherwise.

Although there have been times of uncertainty over the course of its history, particularly in 1997 when government funding ended, ISEP continues to flourish as a comprehensive international education organization serving over 300 member institutions in a growing number of ways. When I joined ISEP in 1981, I was responsible for placing all 300 students in reciprocal exchanges among fewer than 75 institutions. Today, over 2,600 students annually participate in reciprocal ISEP-Exchanges, fee-paid ISEP-Direct programs, short-term study options, and a budding number of service learning and internship opportunities.

Although national trends show that only five US states hosted 43% of incoming international students, ISEP fosters international student diversity at nearly 150 campuses throughout 45 states. A well-tested model combining ISEP-Exchange and ISEP-Direct enrollments in Ghana has also provided scholarships for 44 Ghanaian faculty and staff to pursue graduate study in the United States. A similar program operates in Costa Rica, and others are under development. Additionally, campus representatives meet regularly for professional development and training programs during gatherings of the ISEP Network at conferences, symposia, study tours, and workshops.

Because member universities recognize that the benefits of participating in a global network allows them to do more collectively than individually, ISEP is constantly expanding, providing access to a diverse range of academic partners for all members. US universities connect with over 150 institutions abroad in 42 countries. International members connect with nearly 150 US colleges and universities as well as gain access to institutions in many other countries through International-to-International linkages.

This 30th anniversary year is a celebration of ISEP's collaborative model—our voices and vision—that has become so integral to strengthening and expanding access to international education for many campuses. We welcome you to the ISEP Network and this annual report highlighting our accomplishments of the past year.

In 1979, I returned from a year as a Fulbright lecturer in Japan, an experience that ignited my lifelong interest in international education. That same year, ISEP began with only 28 students from seven institutions. Today, the ISEP Network is 300 members strong in 42 countries.


For nearly 30 years I have had the opportunity to observe ISEP from different perspectives at four member universities: as international program director, department chair, dean, graduate dean, provost, and president. Throughout this time I have admired ISEP's goals and values, which are reflected in the dedication of ISEP Coordinators and staff who work hard to ensure that all ISEP students have an experience of a lifetime.

I also have many gratifying memories of ISEP students, such as the undergraduate from Colombia who, placed in a second-year medical school program with no patient contact allowed, more than held his own; and the American student who, through close supervision and individual study, completed a full year of academic credit in Ghana despite the faculty officially being on strike. These are just two examples of how the ISEP Network has always provided students with unique experiences and personal attention, which are the foundation for ISEP's efforts to broaden its reach as a significant global resource for international education.

The ISEP Board of Directors is cognizant of both this proud history and the enormous potential for future service. It is committed to working with ISEP management to identify new and appropriate ways for the organization to respond to expanding member institution needs to prepare students for success in a global, multicultural environment. This will require innovative approaches and a willingness to experiment with new possibilities—but always to further the values and strengths that have defined ISEP over the last 30 years as a unique organization. REGIONAL HIGHLIGHTS

Africa

ISEP welcomes the University of Botswana to the ISEP Network, along with the new summer programs offered by Stellenbosch University in South Africa.

Asia

Nihon University - Mishima is now part of the ISEP Network in Japan. In addition, ISEP Japan held its second annual conference in September at Toyo University, another member with dramatically increased exchange activity.

Europe

Vesalius University in Brussels became ISEP's first Belgian member and will offer ISEP-Direct programs, as well as a unique graded internship program, beginning in early 2010. University West in Sweden has also joined the network and will offer courses in English in fields ranging from political science to engineering.

Latin America

Puerto Rican members now accept both US and international students. As another regional success, summer program participation at Universidad Nacional–UNA in Costa Rica exceeded expectations.

Oceania

ISEP welcomes the newest Australian member, the University of Western Sydney, offering a wide variety of academic fields and internship options for students. The University of the South Pacific in Fiji has been restored to active member status.

USA

Overall student participation from US institutions remains strong. New members in 2009 are Arkansas State University, Carroll College, Mesa State College, Millsaps College, Northern Arizona University, and Westminster College of Salt Lake City.

Programs

This year, with a 10% increase in student applications, ISEP continued to move toward its strategic goal of establishing a globally balanced network. To this end, ISEP is proud to have added new members in Belgium and Botswana, bringing the total number of countries in the network to 42. Responding to member institution requests for more short-term options, new summer programs have also been added in South Africa and Costa Rica. In addition, to meet the needs of the growing network, ISEP-Central has shifted toward a regionally focused structure and dedicated a full-time staff position to manage membership standards and US member relations. These efforts all reflect ISEP's commitment to campus internationalization, program development, and strategic growth.

ISEP Ambassador Program


The ISEP Ambassador program is in its third year and has grown to over 200 participants. Ambassadors assist with a variety of tasks: volunteering in the international office, welcoming incoming students, recruiting outbound students, promoting ISEP at study abroad fairs, and participating in the ISEP Facebook group. Students and home or host ISEP Coordinators may nominate ambassadors, who receive a customized toolkit, promotional materials, and an ISEP t-shirt. Ambassadors agree to participate in at least three activities each semester and submit a log of their accomplishments. Each year, one student also receives the ISEP Ambassador of the Year award.

Service Learning Initiatives

Volunteering or service learning opportunities at many ISEP universities provide unique insight and integration into the host culture. For example, ISEP participants at Willamette University, USA, can volunteer in the local community by sharing their language and culture at public school presentations. This innovative program, Language in Motion, is now in its third year of operation and has grown to over 60 classroom visits in the past semester. International students and study abroad alumni join in the opportunity to reflect on their cultural experiences and bring global diversity into local classrooms.



Current ISEP Ambassadors are already active on their campuses. Insuk Seok (above)—who went from Ajou University, Korea, to Truman State University, USA—represented ISEP at the Ajou study abroad fair. She also responds to inquiries from prospective students, participates in discussions on the ISEP Facebook page, welcomes visiting ISEP students to Ajou, and distributes ISEP posters and Ambassador postcards on campus. She writes, "My experience as an ISEP exchange student and ambassador has helped me a lot. It allowed me to get a really great job finally! I'm so happy that I am an ISEP Ambassador this semester, and I thank you so much for giving me this opportunity to participate."
