Dear Colleagues:

The 2013 fiscal year witnessed a number of important advances for the ISEP Network. We welcomed new members, launched additional programs, and implemented administrative changes to streamline the application and placement process for ISEP coordinators and students. In particular, we are celebrating the growth in numbers to over 46,000 students who have participated in ISEP programs since the organization was founded in 1979. Additionally, the ISEP Board of Directors, Council of Advisors and Staff have been engaged in a year-long strategic planning process to determine organizational directions for the coming years.

ISEP's basic founding principle is that study abroad should be available for all students regardless of their personal circumstances or where they live. As we enter our 35th year, we have re-confirmed this commitment to international student mobility. Access, diversity and affordability for international education continue to be hallmarks of the ISEP Network and our direct enrollment approach to study abroad.

ISEP provides a strong student support system through our Coordinators, a network of international education professionals, who believe in mutual trust and collaboration. The ISEP Coordinator system empowers students to learn and explore through integration into their host country, culture, and institution.

ISEP's commitment to access and student support engenders continuous refinements. In 2013, we launched a curriculum integration initiative to help students find the right academic placement. This project, along with the development of other tools for advisors and students, will help prepare them for their study abroad. New communication and outreach efforts are meeting the students where they are and preparing them for the life-changing experience of study abroad.

In the coming years, key components of ISEP's future directions include:

- A more vibrant and engaged membership
- A dynamic and diverse range of programs
- An enhanced student experience, and
- Opportunities for faculty engagement.

In closing, we wish to encourage your participation in ISEP's 35th anniversary conference, November 12-15, 2014 in Arlington, Virginia. The theme, *The ISEP Network: Immersion, Sustainability, Empowerment, Partnership*, captures the essence of the ISEP Network and sets the stage for a fruitful gathering of ISEP Coordinators, member representatives, alumni, other international education colleagues and staff. SARAH GARDNER studied abroad at Johannes Kepler Universitat in Austria, where she experienced the challenges of collaborating with people with different work styles and nationalities. However, Sarah says, "before I studied abroad I was set in a black and white type of mentality. Nowadays I find that I am more open to considering multiple courses of action for any number of life events." As an ambassador at the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga, Sarah's communication skills stood out. She participated in: an International Student Organization event where she welcomed exchange students; a finals coffee and bagel study break; a farewell lunch; and hosted one-on-one meetings with students interested in studying abroad.

ALMOATAZ HASSAN's study abroad experience took place at the University of Vermont in the United States. His dedication as an ambassador back home at the American University of Sharjah is what made him a strong candidate for Ambassador of the Year. AlMoataz's organizational skills were a huge asset when planning a study abroad fair at his home institution. "We arranged the fair so as to avoid conflicting with other events; a schedule was set up so at least 2 peer advisors would be present at all times; we passed information about the fair to the exchange students on campus so they could talk to people about their home institutions and countries; and we created posters and social media posts to share with students," says AlMoataz.

Sonia's experience abroad inspired her to hold a Travelogue, an event where people come to talk about their experiences in foreign countries. "We hope that by hearing about other people's exciting and interesting adventures across the globe, more students will want to go on an exchange program." Throughout the course of the semester, eight Travelogues were held, and an average number of 15-20 people attended! Sonia certainly channelled her creativity by creating an environment with such engaging presentations.
