RECOMMENDATIONS FOR FIRST-GENERATION STUDENTS

As a first-generation student, we understand you have unique needs and considerations when planning to study abroad. ISEP is dedicated to providing the information you need to feel confident and supported while choosing a program. This handout outlines some considerations to help guide you through the process.

Things to Know When Planning on Studying Abroad

You can afford to study abroad!

- Most federal financial aid (and sometimes institutional and state aid) can be used towards the cost of your ISEP program.
- If you receive a Pell Grant, you may be eligible for the Gilman Scholarship to study abroad.
- ISEP offers affordable programs so you can pay about what you pay to attend college now. You'll need to plan for travel expenses (like a flight) and a few other administrative expenses.

ISEP is here to help you.

• Your ISEP Student Services Officer can recommend programs based on your specific needs, whether it is extra academic support or mental health resources.

You can take your classes in English!

• We offer programs in English-speaking countries, but we also offer programs at universities where classes are taught in English but locals speak another language (and usually some English).

There are options for your major, so you can still graduate on time.

• ISEP offers ISEP Direct programs in 30+ countries and ISEP Exchanges in more than 50 countries. We work with over 300 universities, and we can find courses for almost any major. Check out our Field of Study guides to see a few examples!

Study Abroad Checklist

- Apply for a passport (if you don't have one or it expires soon). A new U.S. passport is \$130 + fees for photos and mailing.
- Chat with your ISEP Coordinator at your university to learn more about the application process and what financial aid you can use abroad.
- Meet with a financial aid advisor at your home university to see how your aid will work when you study abroad.
- Meet with an ISEP Student Services Officer to find programs that would be a good fit.
- Explore ISEP's identity abroad resources.
- Talk to your family and friends and ask them about their concerns—if you are proactive, it will help you mitigate their worries and answer their questions early.

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RECOMMENDED PROGRAMS FOR FIRST-GENERATION STUDENTS

Below is our list of program recommendations for first generation students. Most sites recommended have a fair (or better) chance of placement, straightforward visa process, academics with predictable course schedules with options available in English, simple commute to campus, and are at institutions known for providing a supportive environment for students.



Study in Seoul | Korea University • •

Experience the vibrant culture capital of Seoul at Korea University, one of South Korea's oldest, largest, and most prestigious universities. Acclimate to a new host culture through experiences coordinated by KU's student buddy program. ISEP's South Korea Program Advisor, Brian Min, is available to help students navigate life in Seoul.



Study in England | University of Chester •

Take in the architectural and natural beauty of Chester while studying at a university dedicated to offering students a supportive and encouraging learning environment. International students will take an "Intercultural Experience Learning" model organized by a local ISEP Host Coordinator to help students get the best out of their exchange.



Study in Chile | Pontificia Universidad Católica de Valparaíso ••

Experience the unique culture of Chile's second largest city: Valparaíso, a UNESCO world heritage site. No language background is required as coursework is available in English and Spanish. Pontificia Universidad Católica de Valparaíso offers support for academics and also for students from historically underrepresented backgrounds.



Study in Finland | Tampere University •
