fee-paid study-abroad programs are open to all members and affiliates; students pay a fee to ISEP, which covers the program cost at the host institution.





ompared to other U.S. students, ISEP students tend to study abroad for longer. In 2005-06, 94% of U.S. ISEP students spent a semester or longer abroad while 6% studied for less than a semester. According to the IIE report Open Doors, in 2004-05, 52% of all U.S. students studying abroad spent less than a semester away while 48% studied a semester or longer.

- Can offer their students access to a wide range of ISEP reciprocal exchange destinations with programs in most academic fields without loss of tuition revenue.


 Benefit from the presence of incoming international students, who bring cultural and linguistic diversity to campus and international perspectives to the curriculum.
